A Season of Review, Renewal, and Readiness

Your Executive Board has been hard at work these past two months ensuring our governing documents reflect how our Club truly operates. We conducted a full, line-by-line review of both the Bylaws and the Policies & Procedures. As your document notes, “There were areas that needed major overhaul to be in alignment with how we do things operationally.”

Because the changes were extensive, we are not providing a simple red-line version. Instead, members may compare the previous Bylaws (2024–2026) with the newly revised Bylaws (2026–2027) on our website.

Key Bylaw Updates

- **One-year terms:** Bylaws now run for one year rather than two. Term limits remain, but each term is now a single year (Article VIII).
- **VP Elect removed:** The former VP Elect/Membership succession model has been discontinued. While we retain a VP of Membership (Article VII), that role no longer assumes automatic succession to President.
- **Operational alignment:** Policies & Procedures have been updated to match the revised Bylaws.

Fiscal Year, Dues, and Financial Review

Our fiscal year is now officially June 1–May 31, aligned with our software system. Dues cannot be pro-rated; for example, members joining in April will renew for the new year beginning June 1.

A financial review was conducted by Michele Williams, a non-member. As your document states, “She found we are in a good financial position, but made some recommendations for storing our data digitally... for security and succession purposes.” We have already begun implementing these improvements. Thank you, Michele!

Business Meetings: Clarity, Transparency, and Participation

We clarified what constitutes a Business Meeting and when they occur. Beginning this fall:

- **September & October meetings: A 15–20 minute Business Meeting will open each session.**
- **May & June: Business Meetings will occur annually as we close one fiscal year and begin another with a new Board (Article V, Sec. 2).**
- **September: Brief overview of revised Bylaws, Policies & Procedures, and Budget.**
- **October: Membership to vote on these documents, by acclimation.**

My hope is that this helps us become more democratic and transparent.

Budget Highlights for 2026–2027

Upon review, the Board determined our reserves were higher than necessary. We agreed to maintain \$3,000 in reserves — a prudent but not excessive amount.

Recurring Expenses

- Office supplies
- Technology (including our website, generously discounted by a patriotic supporter)
- Storage unit rental

Reel Series Funding

Member donations covered most costs. The Club contributed \$389 toward the MLPC License and popcorn supplies. I anticipate if the series is a success that we would see a modest increase in licensing for next year.

Parade Float

We have \$345 remaining for next year's float. If no volunteers step forward by October, we will retire the float — though individual golf carts may still participate.

A Special December Event

We are planning a festive Christmas gathering for December 4. Highlights include:

- A receiving line with our political family (federal, state, and local)
- Cash bar
- Hors d'oeuvres and light desserts
- Small ticket fee to reserve your spot
- Club covers most of the cost

We look forward to celebrating with you!



We have allocated \$200 for charitable giving. Based on member survey results, we recommend supporting Bob's House of Hope / Ranch Hands Rescue, which serves both veterans and male survivors of human trafficking.

They basically are the only safe house nationwide for male survivors of human trafficking... many of the original clients were from the military. Thus, they hit both boxes our membership asked for; military/veteran's and children!

We hope to welcome them at our December event.

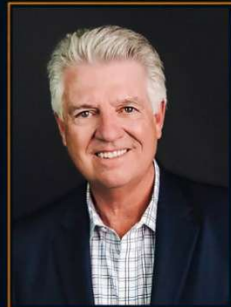

A teenager rebelling against his family and school seems headed for a miserable life until his older brother forces him to run track. Louis Zamperini sets a national high school record for the mile that stands for twenty years. He becomes the youngest American runner in the 1936 Olympics, finishing a stunning 56-second final lap of the 5,000 meters when a 70-second final lap

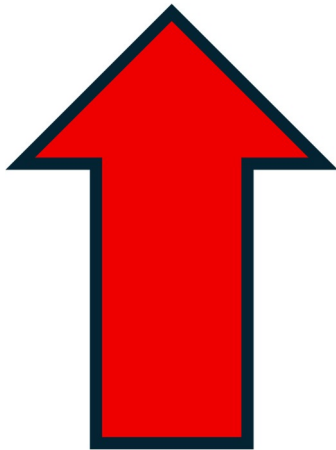
was remarkable. As a volunteer bombardier against Japan, he survives 47 days at sea and proves unbreakable under brutal torture in a POW camp.

On one mission, his plane suffers 574 holes as it struggles to stay airborne for five hours before a crash landing. His crew must fly the air-unworthy Green Hornet, which is shot down, leaving him and two others to starve in a raft. His captors discover his Olympic feats, but his refusal to broadcast propaganda yields savage abuse on “Execution Island” from “The Bird.” America welcomes a returned hero, not knowing that PTSD is leading to alcoholism and divorce.

Prison nightmares follow him stateside, though alcohol dims them until his wife wants a divorce. To avert that, he sullenly agrees to attend a Billy Graham crusade, where accepting Christ transforms him, ending the nightmares. Having received mercy, he returns to Japan to forgive his imprisoned former captors individually. Louis Zamperini, who died at age 97 in 2014, confirms the Apostle Paul’s testimony: “I have finished the race.” Do we conservatives regard life as purposeful, though costly?

Continuing Up-Ballot



Understanding Your Ballot: Constables vs. Sheriff

As we continue to move up ballot, we now turn to the roles of both Constables and the County Sheriff — two key offices in Denton County’s justice system. While the Sheriff will appear on the November ballot, our Precinct 4 Constable, Danny Fletcher, is not up for election this cycle. These offices sound similar, but they serve distinct roles within our local justice system — each essential to keeping county operations running smoothly.

Constables: The Court’s Enforcement Arm

Constables are licensed peace officers who primarily serve the Justice of the Peace courts. Their duties include:

- Serving civil process (subpoenas, summonses, eviction notices)

- Executing JP issued warrants
- Supporting JP court operations
- Assisting with traffic enforcement and community safety within their precinct.

Constables are licensed Texas peace officers certified through the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement (TCOLE), the statewide agency that sets professional standards and training requirements for all peace officers. In reality, they are state certified peace officers with the same licensing requirements as police officers, sheriff's deputies, and state troopers.

In Denton County, each precinct elects its own Constable. For Precinct 4 — the precinct serving Robson Ranch — voters are served by: • Constable Danny Fletcher (Pct. 4) Note: Constable Fletcher is not on the 2026 ballot. He was re elected in 2024 and his current term runs through December 31, 2028.

Spotlight on Constable Danny Fletcher (Precinct 4)

Constable Danny Fletcher serves Denton County Precinct 4, which includes the Robson Ranch community. He assumed office on January 1, 2021 and his current term ends on December 31, 2028. Fletcher has built a reputation for steady leadership, professionalism, and a calm, community focused approach to law enforcement. He entered public service after a career in policing that emphasized civil process, warrant service, and community engagement — experience that prepared him well for the unique responsibilities of a Constable's office.

Fletcher is known for maintaining strong working relationships with the Justice of the Peace courts, ensuring that civil documents, eviction orders, and JP issued warrants are handled promptly and respectfully. Over his tenure, he has

been recognized for his responsiveness to residents, his commitment to transparency, and his efforts to modernize precinct operations. His office is often praised for its courteous service, clear communication, and dedication to treating every civil matter with fairness and dignity.

Constables ensure that JP court orders are carried out efficiently, lawfully, and with proper documentation. Their work is a critical link between the courts and the community.

Sheriff: Countywide Law Enforcement

The Sheriff is the county's chief law enforcement officer, responsible for the Denton County Jail, criminal investigations, and patrols in unincorporated areas. The Sheriff's Office also supports other agencies during emergencies and oversees courthouse security. Like Constables, Sheriffs in Texas are state certified peace officers licensed through the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement (TCOLE), which sets the professional standards and training requirements for all peace officers statewide.

Spotlight on Sheriff Tracy Murphree

Sheriff Tracy Murphree has served as Denton County's chief law enforcement officer since January 1, 2017, bringing nearly four decades of experience in Texas policing to the role. Before being elected Sheriff, Murphree served as a Texas Highway Patrol Trooper, later rising to become a Texas Ranger covering Denton and Cooke Counties — a position reserved for highly trained investigators and leaders. He also worked as Captain of the Criminal Investigations Division at the Denton County Sheriff's Office, overseeing complex cases and major operations.

Since taking office, Murphree has focused on strengthening internal accountability, modernizing operations, restoring key units, and improving coordination with local police departments and county courts. His long tenure reflects both experience and continuity in overseeing the Denton County Jail, criminal investigations, emergency response, and countywide public safety.

Note: Sheriff Murphree is on the November 2026 ballot.

While Constables focus on civil matters tied to JP courts, the Sheriff's jurisdiction covers criminal law enforcement and detention across the entire county. It's a broader role — one that coordinates with local police departments and state agencies.

How They Work Together

Constables and the Sheriff often collaborate. Constables handle JP related civil matters; Sheriffs oversee criminal enforcement and detention. Both are licensed Texas peace officers.

Why It Matters

Understanding these distinctions helps voters appreciate how local justice functions day to day. Each office plays a part in maintaining order, protecting rights, and ensuring that court decisions are enforced fairly.
